#### Special Issue Information

Dear Colleagues,

This Special Issue focuses on how recent urbanization processes modifies the organization and management of the land uses at integrated rural areas in peri-urban and intra-metropolitan areas at local, national, and global levels.

Recent rural dynamics are primarily characterized by three interrelated trends: economic diversification, deagrarianization, and depopulation; the first two of which common to all rural areas.

It is true that deagrarianization and the simultaneous shift towards a service economy in present-day rural economies and societies have not led to the disappearance of rural space but instead some rural areas are presenting extraordinary territorial and economic transformation. These comprise zones that fall between the countryside and the city where intensive rural urbanization or peri-urbanization processes are taking place.

In the past, primary sector activities were very important, but their importance has steadily declined in both absolute and relative. Agricultural activity has become relatively unimportant as urban activities and functions acquire greater prominence. This has substantially weakened and modified agricultural activities and transformed land use patterns in rural regions.

Nevertheless, in recent decades, agricultural activities had received new functions in peri-urban areas. As a common factor of all them, the acknowledgment of biodiversity and heritage values in the agricultural uses and the compatibility of both with quality food production. These concepts include eco-system services, peri-urban agricultural parks or home market agriculture, and urban productive landscapes.

Land use policy, especially legal regulations relating to construction land supply, are critical tools to harness territorial development. The policy trajectory of construction land supply entails a complicated reconfiguration of public functions, which is driven by rural–urban relations. The integrated urban-rural development should be raised through the experimentation of a new use policy and land management.

Many unanswered questions remain regarding the impacts of urbanization on rural areas. Contributions to this Special Issue could serve to provide some answers.

We invite papers that link countryside urbanization, deagrarianization, land management, land use planning, urban sprawl into rural areas, and integrated rural-urban development.

Presentación: El Grupo de Trabajo de Geografía Rural de la Asociación Española de Geografía y el Departamento de Geografía de la Universidad de Valladolid organizan el XX Coloquio de Geografía Rural, ColoRURAL 2020 (III Coloquio

Internacional de Geografía Rural). Siguiendo la línea que el Grupo de Trabajo iniciara hace ahora cuarenta años (Alicante, 1980), el Comité Organizador continúa la labor de hacer que estos Coloquios sean un lugar de encuentro y reflexión sobre los espacios rurales y el complejo espectro de usos, de usuarios y sobre todo de problemas que se suscitan en estas áreas (Ortega, 2000).


También pretende que su forma de presentación siga siendo una plataforma de difusión de los trabajos de los expertos ruralistas no solo españoles, sino de América Latina y de los pertenecientes a organizaciones homólogas de la Red Europea de Geografía Rural.

Esta edición lleva por lema Espacios rurales y retos demográficos. Una mirada desde los territorios de la despoblación. Se pretende atender, así, a la creciente preocupación de la sociedad por los problemas demográficos de estos territorios y sus consecuencias, interrogándose por ellos y, sobre todo, proponiendo respuestas.

El marco teórico tiene que situarse en esas coordenadas. Desde que Kayser (1990) formulase su tesis sobre el "renacimiento rural"

Espacios rurales y retos demográficos: una mirada desde los territorios de la despoblación han pasado más de treinta años. En aquel momento se hablaba del resurgimiento de "lo rural" en Europa tras décadas de abandono. Paradójicamente, el cambio demográfico en general, y la despoblación rural en particular, es uno de los retos a los que se enfrentan muchas regiones europeas. En el caso de España se habla de vaciamiento rural, de crisis demográfica, de los "territorios vacíos", donde las bajas densidades dominan en comarcas enteras y donde cientos de municipios se sitúan en el límite de la despoblación.

El Coloquio se desarrolla en Valladolid, en Castilla y León, una región de marcado carácter rural que cuenta con una amplia proporción de su territorio afectada por problemas de aletia y riesgo de despoblación. No se pretende tanto indagar en sus causas (se entiende que ya suficientemente estudiadas) como en sus consecuencias y manifestaciones, y, sobre todo, en los retos y en las respuestas que desde la Geografía se formulan para atajar el problema. En este sentido, el Grupo de Geografía Rural se alinea con lo expresado por la Asociación Española de Geografía en su manifiesto Abordar el reto demográfico, hacer frente a la despoblación, cuando señala que "socialmente tenemos un reto decisivo", y urge a "asumir los retos derivados del cambio demográfico como una prioridad por parte de la ciudadanía, de los gestores y de los políticos...", apelando a las distintas esferas comprometidas con el desarrollo territorial, entre las que se encuentra la académico-científica, para alcanzar este objetivo común. Las cuestiones planteadas en ese manifiesto constituyen un sólido argumento para orientar las ponencias invitadas, cuyo contenido inicial ha dado lugar a la presente obra.

**Abstract:** Depopulation is one of the main problems in declining rural territories, whose inhabitants have the perception of being immersed in a spiral of socio-economic deterioration where each setback experienced in the region push a greater number of young people towards the decision to emigrate. This process was described by the economist G. Myrdal through his theory of circular and cumulative causation (CCC), which explains both the territorial processes of decline and economic and demographic improvement found in other regions. Applying the CCC approach to investigate the causes that for decades have led young people to emigrate from a region of so-called Empty Spain, the Altiplano de Granada, this article describes its linkage with three closely interrelated factors of territorial development: human capital, social capital, and capacity for innovation. The results of the binary logistic regression analysis based on a survey of 446 young people between 15 and 19 years of age, suggest four main predictors of the intention to stay in their rural hometowns: gender, the personal attachment, the father's education level, and the interest in the family history. Conversely, no significant relations were found between social capital and intention to stay or leave the Altiplano de Granada. Specific recommendations for policies and rural development programs emerge from these results regarding the inclusion of youth, education systems, and local innovation systems as a priority.
